Executive Summary

Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by the Environment and Development Services team at Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council (Rotherham MBC) to carry out an archaeological scoping study of a further 40 sites that are being considered for inclusion in Rotherham MBC's Local Plan.

Heritage assets and historic landscapes within and around each site have been identified to allow an assessment to be made of the archaeological potential of each site and the likely implications for future development. Where archaeological potential varied within a site it has been subdivided, resulting in a new total of 45 sites.

The results of the assessments are tabulated in **Section 7** of this document and presented as individual site reports and maps in **Section 8**. The assessment identified:

Major archaeological objections to allocation	6 (14%) sites with major archaeological objections to allocation. These are not suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan and are shown as RED on the maps.
Potential archaeological objections to allocation	10 (22%) sites with potential objections to allocation. These sites are suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan but there is a high risk that they contain heritage assets that will affect any future development proposals. These sites are shown as YELLOW on the maps.
Uncertain archaeological objections to allocation	23 (51%) sites with uncertain objections to allocation. These sites are suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan but there is an unknown level of risk as they could contain heritage assets that pose a risk to development. These sites are shown as YELLOW/GREEN STRIPES on the maps.
Little or no archaeological objections to allocation	6 (13%) sites with little or no objections to allocation. These sites are suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan as there is a low risk that they contain heritage assets that pose a risk to development. These sites are shown as GREEN on the maps.

These four categories are discussed in detail in **Section 5**, with summaries of the likely planning requirements for dealing with archaeological concerns and of the potential risks to Local Plan allocation and future development proposals if significant archaeological remains are present.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Project summary

- 1.1.1 Wessex Archaeology undertook a scoping study of an initial 145 sites for inclusion in the Rotherham Local Plan in 2012 (Wessex Archaeology 2012; hereafter 'Phase 1'). A further 66 preferred sites were assessed in 2013a (Wessex Archaeology 2013a; hereafter 'Phase 2'). The current project (hereafter 'Phase 3') comprises a review of existing archaeological and historic environment character data for an additional 40 potential preferred sites, in order to assess the presence of designated and/or identified heritage assets within each site and a pre-determined study area around it.
- 1.1.2 Heritage assets and historic landscapes, within and surrounding each site have been considered to provide an evidence base for the assessment of the archaeological potential of each potential preferred site. Recommendations are made regarding the suitability of each potential preferred development site in terms of heritage constraints.

1.2 Project background

1.2.1 Wessex Archaeology was commissioned by the Environment and Development Services team at Rotherham MBC to carry out an archaeological scoping study (Wessex Archaeology 2012, 2013a). Rotherham MBC has now identified a further 40 potential preferred sites for new development to meet Core Strategy targets for new housing and employment land in Rotherham District over the plan period to 2028. These include the identification (within the Core Strategy 2014 as submitted) of 'broad locations' for significant medium to large scale new development - mainly comprising urban extensions into the Green Belt. They include preferred sites for new housing and employment sites that will be detailed in the emerging Sites and Policies Document. An assessment of the suitability of these sites considered for potential allocation in the Local Plan and possible development, in relation to their archaeological potential, is now required to the same standards and methodology as the previous studies (Wessex Archaeology 2012, 2013a).

1.3 Planning policy

- 1.3.1 National planning policy, set out in the National Planning Policy Framework (DCLG 2012) requires that planning authorities deliver sustainable development and requires consideration of the historic environment in policies and decisions concerning the historic environment, this includes recognising the wider importance of the historic environment and measures where:
 - 126. Local planning authorities should set out in their Local Plan a positive strategy for the conservation and enjoyment of the historic environment...
 - 128. In determining applications, local planning authorities should require an applicant to describe the significance of any heritage assets affected, including any contribution made by their setting...



1.3.2 Following on from the Publication Core Strategy, Rotherham MBC has identified proposed sites for new housing and employment in the Draft Sites and Policies Document dated May 2013. The initial Archaeological Scoping Study of Site Allocations (Wessex Archaeology 2012) assessed 145 sites to determine the suitability of these sites for future development, in relation to their archaeological potential. Refinement of the allocations in 2013 identified a further 66 sites requiring assessment for their archaeological potential, necessitating an extension to the earlier archaeological scoping study (Wessex Archaeology 2013a). In 2014, a further 40 sites were identified for assessment and will form an additional extension to the 2012 and the 2013 scoping studies.

2 AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

2.1 Aims

2.1.1 The overall aim of the project was to collect and collate information on the 40 potential preferred sites, in order to allow an assessment to be made of the archaeological potential of each potential preferred site and make recommendations as to their suitability for potential allocation and future development in terms of heritage constraints. The specific aims were:

Aim 1	To collate existing digital data in order to provide an evidence base for assessment.
Aim 2	To compile a geodatabase to identify heritage assets within each potential preferred site and its study area.
Aim 3	To identify the significance of heritage assets and historic landscapes within each potential preferred site and its study area.
Aim 4	To assess the archaeological potential of each potential preferred site and its study area.
Aim 5	To make recommendations as to the suitability of each potential preferred area for potential allocation and future development in terms of heritage constraints.
Aim 6	To prepare a report identifying, for each potential preferred area, heritage assets and their significance; archaeological potential; and suitability for allocation.

2.2 Objectives

2.2.1 The objects of the project were:

Objective 1	To contribute to the evidence base of Rotherham MBC's Local Plan to meet national and regional planning policy requirements to ensure that its preparation is based upon an understanding of the local archaeological resource.
Objective 2	To establish the known or expected archaeological potential of the sites identified as a potential preferred site for future development by Rotherham MBC.
Objective	To provide information that can inform subsequent decisions on



whether to include all or only some of these potential 'preferred' development sites within the Local Plan Sites and Policies Document.

3 METHODOLOGY

3.1 Introduction

3.1.1 A Project Design (Wessex Archaeology 2013b) was prepared by Wessex Archaeology in accordance with the guidance set out in Management of Research Projects in the Historic Environment ('MoRPHE', English Heritage 2006). The Project Design was approved by Rotherham MBC and the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service prior to the commencement of the study.

3.2 Data sources

- 3.2.1 The following data sources were consulted:
 - Digital Ordnance Survey base map data and the boundaries of the potential preferred sites were provided by Rotherham MBC;
 - Digital Historic Environment Characterisation data, Sites and Monuments Record data and aerial photographic cropmark data were provided by the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service;
 - Non-digital data sources (documents, plans etc.) held by the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service;
 - GIS-based data relating to all listed buildings in England, held by Wessex Archaeology;
 - The National Heritage List for England;
 - Historic and modern Ordnance Survey maps, and
 - Online sources for aerial photograph and satellite imagery.

3.3 Data handling and analysis

- 3.3.1 An ArcGIS geodatabase was constructed to support the spatial analysis of the potential preferred development sites in relation to known heritage assets, modern and historic mapping and aerial photographs. Spatial queries were used to select the heritage assets potentially affected (both directly and indirectly) by the proposed development sites and the resulting lists were used to populate the heritage asset records.
- 3.3.2 Rotherham MBC's existing site reference codes were preserved for this study and the following information was recorded for each proposed development site:
 - A summary of the information consulted.
 - Heritage assets that may be directly affected by the development of the site.
 - Heritage assets and historic landscapes within 250m of the site boundary or that otherwise may be affected by development through effects on their setting.
 - An assessment of the archaeological potential of the proposed site.
 - A recommendation for each potential preferred site on the suitability of all or part of the site for allocation.



- 3.3.3 A Microsoft Access interface to the system provided a summary view of the data on a site by site basis. The presence and significance of known or potential archaeological heritage assets was considered and assessed and a summary of this information was entered as plain text into the database form.
- 3.3.4 Where areas of significantly differing archaeological potential were identified within a site, the site was split into sub-areas for separate assessment. These areas are uniquely identifiable but remain referenced to the original potential preferred site.
- 3.3.5 These data were extracted from the geodatabase as the individual site reports that form **Section 8** of this report.

3.4 The assessment process

3.4.1 The significance of identified and potential heritage assets was assigned using professional judgement taking into account the nature of the heritage interest; the extent of the fabric (or site) that holds that interest; and the level of importance of that interest with reference to the heritage values set out in English Heritage's Conservation Principles (2008).

3.5 Consultation with South Yorkshire Archaeology Service

3.5.1 Completed site assessments were submitted to the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service for approval prior to the compilation of this report. Where concerns or comments were raised the assessments have been amended to take account of the additional information provided by the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service.

3.6 Assumptions and limitations

- 3.6.1 The data used to compile this report consists of secondary information derived from a variety of sources, only some of which have been directly examined for the purposes of this Study. The assumption is made that this data, as well as that derived from other secondary sources, is reasonably accurate.
- 3.6.2 The records held by South Yorkshire Sites and Monuments Record are not a record of all surviving elements of the cultural heritage resource, but a record of the discovery of a wide range of heritage assets. The information held within it is not complete and does not preclude the subsequent discovery of further elements of the historic environment that are, at present, unknown.

4 PRESENTATION OF RESULTS

4.1 Summary

- 4.1.1 The results of the assessments are tabulated in **Section 7** and presented as individual site reports in **Section 8**. Location maps of the potential preferred sites are included in **Section 9**.
- 4.1.2 Combined tables of results from the three scoping studies are also presented in **Section** 7.
- 4.1.3 Each site report includes location information, map, site assessment and a summary list of identified heritage assets. The first page of each site report includes a map of the proposed site that is colour-coded to provide a visual indicator of the likely archaeological



- implications of development, with red indicating significant archaeological constraints, through yellow and yellow/green stripes, to green indicating little or no archaeological constraints.
- 4.1.4 Each report also includes a site assessment with statements of archaeological significance and recommendations (see **4.2** and **4.3** below). This is followed by a summary of known heritage assets and historic landscapes within the site and the 250m study area and includes English Heritage designations where relevant. Each report concludes with:
 - a) an assessment of the possibility of encountering heritage assets within the site and the likely significance of each type of asset, and
 - b) a summary of the predicted survival of heritage assets at the site.

4.2 Definitions: Archaeological significance

- 4.2.1 Each site has been allocated a significance level of International, National, Regional, high Local, medium Local, low Local, Negligible or Unknown depending upon the factors described in the table below.
- 4.2.2 Significance has been assessed taking into account current understanding of the heritage assets. In most cases this does not include any detailed desk-based research or field investigation and therefore the allotted significance should be considered as provisional pending further information. Sites may contain heritage assets of varying levels of significance, in which case the highest level of significance has been applied to the whole site or recorded as 'unknown', depending upon the nature of the heritage assets that are present or anticipated.

4.3 Definitions: Recommendations

4.3.1 The suitability of each site for potential allocation and possible development has been assessed based on heritage constraints, leading to one of the following four recommendations:

Major archaeological objections to allocation	The site contains, or is close to, <i>known</i> archaeological remains of national or regional significance and there has been little or no previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be moderate or good.
Potential archaeological objections to allocation	The site contains, or is close to, <i>known</i> archaeological remains of regional or local significance and there has been little or no previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be moderate or good.
Uncertain archaeological objections to allocation	The site contains, or is close to, known or predicted archaeological remains of local or unknown significance or there has been little or no previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be moderate or good.
Little or no archaeological objections to allocation	The site contains no known or predicted archaeological remains or there has been significant previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be poor.



4.3.2 The implications of these recommendations for the Local Plan are discussed in **Section 5** below.

5 RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

5.1 Summary

- 5.1.1 The results of the study are tabulated in **Section 7** and presented as individual site reports in **Section 8**. Maps showing site locations are included in **Section 9**.
- 5.1.2 Where warranted the potential preferred sites were subdivided to more than one recommendation per site, resulting in a new total of 45 sites.

5.1.3 The assessment identified:

Major archaeological objections to allocation	6 (14%) sites with major archaeological objections to allocation. These are not suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan and are shown as RED on the maps.
Potential archaeological objections to allocation	10 (22%) sites with potential objections to allocation. These sites are suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan but there is a high risk that they contain heritage assets that will affect any future development proposals. These sites are shown as YELLOW on the maps.
Uncertain archaeological objections to allocation	23 (51%) sites with uncertain objections to allocation. These sites are suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan but there is an unknown level of risk as they could contain heritage assets that pose a risk to development. These sites are shown as YELLOW/GREEN STRIPES on the maps.
Little or no archaeological objections to allocation	6 (13%) sites with little or no objections to allocation. These sites are suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan as there is a low risk that they contain heritage assets that pose a risk to development. These sites are shown as GREEN on the maps.



5.2 Sites with major archaeological objections to allocation

The site contains, or is close to, known archaeological remains of national or regional significance <u>and</u> there has been little or no previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be moderate or good.

Sites

5.2.1 The following sites are in this category: GB0005, LDF0049, 0325A 0346, 0811 and 0819

Recommendation

5.2.2 It is recommended that these sites are not included in the Local Plan as this would result in a conflict with historic environment planning policy.

Planning requirements

- 5.2.3 In the event that, following further consideration, this site is proposed for development, further archaeological investigation will be required, *prior to the submission of a planning application*, to establish the presence/absence, significance and condition of heritage assets at the site. The planning application should be supported by a Heritage Statement that includes an assessment of the impact of the specific development proposals based on the results of a staged evaluation which is likely to involve one or more of the following:
 - Detailed desk-based assessment
 - Geophysical survey
 - Fieldwalking
 - Trial trenches

Archaeological risks

- 5.2.4 If significant archaeological remains are present there is potential for:
 - A recommendation for refusal of the application on heritage grounds
 - A requirement for the re-design of the proposals
 - A requirement for mitigation works, such as detailed excavation

5.3 Sites with potential archaeological objections to allocation

The site contains, or is close to, known archaeological remains of regional or local significance <u>and</u> there has been little or no previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be moderate or good.

Sites

5.3.1 The following ten sites are in this category: LDF0020, 0274, 0325B, 0517, 0575, 0740, 0810, 0812B, 0815B and 0826.



Recommendation

5.3.2 These sites are considered to be suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan but developers should be aware that further archaeological information will be required, and there are risks associated with any development.

Planning requirements

- 5.3.3 These sites will require further archaeological investigation, *prior to the submission of a planning application*, to establish the presence/absence, significance and condition of heritage assets at the site, and to allow the final scheme to be designed accordingly, i.e. having taken archaeological constraints into consideration. The planning application should be supported by a Heritage Statement that includes an assessment of the impact of the specific development proposals based on the results of a staged evaluation which is likely to involve one or more of the following:
 - Detailed desk-based assessment
 - Geophysical survey
 - Fieldwalking
 - Trial trenches

Archaeological risks

- 5.3.4 If significant archaeological remains are present there is potential for:
 - A recommendation for refusal of the application on heritage grounds
 - A requirement for the re-design of the proposals
 - A requirement for mitigation works, such as detailed excavation

5.4 Sites with uncertain archaeological objections to allocation

The site contains, or is close to, known or predicted archaeological remains of local or unknown significance <u>or</u> there has been little or no previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be moderate or good.

Sites

5.4.1 The following 23 sites are in this category: LDF0129, 0223, 0288, 0296, 0297, 0299, 0322, 0358, 0374, 0403, 0469, 0583, 0584, 0585, 0717, 0730, 0772, 0812C, 0813, 0814, 0815A, 0822B, 0830.

Recommendation

5.4.2 These sites are considered to be suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan but developers should be aware that further archaeological information will be required and there are risks associated with any development.



Planning requirements

- 5.4.3 These sites will require further archaeological investigation to establish the presence/absence, significance and condition of heritage assets at the site. A staged evaluation should be initiated *prior to the submission of a planning application* and the application should be supported by a Heritage Statement that includes an assessment of the impact of the specific development proposals based on the results of a staged evaluation. Further stages of evaluation may be required as a *condition of planning consent*. Developers should consult the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service for site-specific advice. Evaluation is likely to involve one or more of the following stages:
 - Detailed desk-based assessment
 - Geophysical survey
 - Fieldwalking
 - Trial trenches

Archaeological risks

- 5.4.4 If significant archaeological remains are present there is potential for:
 - A recommendation for refusal of the application on heritage grounds
 - A requirement for the re-design of the proposals
 - A requirement for mitigation works, such as detailed excavation

5.5 Sites with little or no objections to allocation

The site contains no known or predicted archaeological remains <u>or</u> there has been significant previous development or disturbance on the site and archaeological survival is predicted to be poor.

Sites

5.5.1 The following six sites are in this category: LDF0192, 0242, 0812A, 0822A, 0827 and 0828.

Recommendation

5.5.2 These sites are considered to be suitable for inclusion in the Local Plan with no significant risks.

Planning requirements

5.5.3 Planning applications to develop these sites should include a copy of the relevant scoping study from this report and the South Yorkshire Archaeology Service should be consulted to establish whether any further archaeological investigation will be required as a condition of planning consent.

Archaeological risks

5.5.4 No archaeological work will be required prior to the submission of an application and any planning condition requirements are likely to be limited.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. Within the wider landscape, 500m, are two sections of the Scheduled Monument "Roman Ridge" and three Grade II Listed Buildings.

The SMR records nine undesignated heritage assets within the Site. Two of these relate to Iron Age/Romano-British enclosures, field boundaries and other earthworks identified from aerial photographs and from walkover surveys. An additional two sets of unclassified cropmarks are contained within the Site seemingly comprising an enclosure with two banks and ditches. A flint microlith, other flints and pottery, including Samian ware, Derbyshire ware and grey coarse ware along with a six pointed caltrop have also been found within the Site. A further set of Iron Age/Romano-British enclosures and other earthworks are located within the Study Area, approximately 230m north of the Site alongside the findspot of a Roman Coin approximately 250m south of the Site and further Roman pottery and undated flint finds.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project covers the eastern part of the Site and records three features within the Study Area relating to an Iron Age/Romano-British ditch and enclosure which is also recorded by the HER. A further two features are recorded within the Study Area, a 20th century colliery and air raid shelter.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was covered by agricultural fields, "Golden Smithies Plantation" and a section of a former racecourse labelled as "Training Ground" on the First Edition OS map (1854). This label does not change to "racecourse disused" until the late 1970s/early 1980s. By the 1930s OS map a farmhouse has been built in the centre of the Site. Little else changes across the Site throughout the 20th century aside from the removal of field boundaries, a process which continues until the 1990s.

Post-1990s APs show the Site to comprise several large fields used for agriculture with the outline of the former racecourse and "Training Ground" still visible within the southern section of the Site, although some sections appear to have been ploughed.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Due to the presence of Iron Age Romano-British features identified from aerial photographs within the Site there is a high possibility of disturbing these remains which would be of at least regional significance. There is a high possibility of disturbing 19th century, or earlier, remains relating to the former racecourse and training ground which could be up to regional significance.

Surviva

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good to moderate. Most of the Site has remained relatively undisturbed since the middle of the 19th century indicating earlier remains should be relatively well preserved. The survival of the former racecourse is considered to be moderate as although the morphology of the course is still visible some sections have been ploughed with others now covered by vegetation.

Note

GB0005 is part of a larger area known as "Swinton Race Course Green Belt Area". This area includes LDF297, 298, 299, 346, 379, 810, 811 and 819 which have been considered separately. This report refers specifically to the remainder of the green belt island.





There are three statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area comprising the Scheduled medieval moated site known as "Blue Man's Bower", and two Grade II listed mileposts. In the wider Study Area, 500m, lies a Grade II* Listed 13th to 14th century barn at "Whiston Hall".

The SMR records just one undesignated site in the Study Area comprising a scatter of prehistoric worked flint found by Harold Copley in the late 1940s. Canklow Woods lies the north-east end of the wider Study Area which contains the remains of prehistoric activity in the form of flint scatters and evidence for Iron Age and Romano-British settlement activity that has been scheduled as being of national significance. The Roman Road between Chesterfield and Templeborough runs north west to south east approximately 300m north east of the Site.

The site was not included in the Magensian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the site.

The HEC records the present character of the site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1945 to 2003, with fragmentary historic character of Piecemeal Enclosure from 1066 to 1944. The site is assigned to the Agglomerated Enclosures character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within one field on the First Edition OS map (1854) and has changed very little since the mid-19th century. A footpath is shown along the southern boundary of the site, along Whiston Brook, and a well is located in the eastern corner from the 1890s onwards.

The Modern OS map indicates the Site comprises an open field with a small compound area located towards the north-western corner.

Post-1990 APs show an a compound associated with road improvements on the north-western side of the field.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Given the presence of prehistoric and Romano-British remains in the wider Study Area, there is an unknown potential for encountering remains from this period within the Site which could be up to regional significance. Given the presence of statutorily designated heritage assets dated to the medieval period in the Study Area, there is an unknown potential for encountering remains from this period within the Site which could be up to national significance. Any development must consider the impact on the setting of the Scheduled "Blue Man's Bower".

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is good due to a lack of previous disturbance aside from two locations within the northern section of the Site.



There is one statutorily designated heritage asset within the Study Area, a 270m long section of the "Roman Ridge" Scheduled Monument which terminates approximately 150m to the east of the Site. A further section of the Scheduled Monument lies at the northern end of the broader landscape, 500m

The SMR records four undesignated heritage assets within the Study Area. Cropmarks features thought to be Iron Age or Romano-British date have been recorded on the north side of Wentworth Road, immediately to the north of the Site and single sherd of Roman pottery was found in Rawmarsh in 1986. Other recorded features in the Study Area include evidence for ridge and furrow cultivation, identified as geophysical anomalies, a late 18th to 19th century pottery works and a undated pottery kiln.

The Site was not included in the Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information was available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1781-2004 with an invisible historic character of Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 1066-1780. The Site is assigned to the Survey Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was a series of open fields on the First Edition OS map (1854). Cleggs Cottage is located in the north end of the Site and a footpath traverses broadly north-south from the cottage. A linear feature is recorded at the southern end of the Site continuing on the same alignment of the "Roman Ridge" and may therefore represent a continuation of this monument through the Site. By the 1890s, however, this feature is no longer shown. It is assumed that the majority of above ground remains have been ploughed out. The 1940s OS map indicates the Site is covered in slag heaps.

Post-1990 APs show the Site as a large open field with all the field boundaries seen on the historic OS maps removed. The footpath is still in use with the Site currently used for arable agriculture.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Due to the presence of the Scheduled monument "Roman Ridge" within the Study Area, and its contiuned route through the Site as evidenced by historic OS maps, there is a high possibility of disturbing associated remains which could have national significance. Due to the proximity of the Site to known heritage assets identified by cropmarks from aerial photographs there is an increased likelihood of encountering remains from the Iron Age/Romano-British period. However, due to the fact these features have not yet been confirmed through excavation the possibility of disturbing them is recorded as uncertain with the significance recorded as unknown. Although there are no known prehistoric or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site such remains are difficult to predict or exclude. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance recorded as unknown.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is currently unknown. Historic OS maps indicate the section of the "Roman Ridge" monument which ran through the Site has been ploughed out. This was later confirmed by an inspection by South Yorkshire Archaeology Service in the 1980s which identified only a "slight ridge" remaining. The Site has continued to be regularly ploughed since then likely further removing the remaining above ground remains. However, this does not exclude the possibility of sub-surface remains. There remains the portential for such remains to be relatively undisturbed. The presence of several slag heaps on the Site in the 1940s indicate the Site may have suffered considerable disturbance if any excavation occurred. If the slag heaps were brought in from another location survival may be good.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. One undesignated heritage assets is located approximately 13m north of the Site comprising the findspot of a broken late prehistoric flint arrowhead.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records an area of post-medieval ridge and furrow, identified as cropmarks and standing earthworks, approximately 133m south of the Site.

The HEC records the Site as being split between the present character areas of Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Sports Ground 1954-2003 and Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-2003 with a partial legibility of historic character of Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Strip Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates that by the 1st Edition OS map (1854) the Site was split into two fields with a boundary running in an east-west alignment. By the 1900 map this boundary has been removed. Little changes on the Site until the late 1960s when a cricket ground with a pavilion is built within the eastern third of the Site, with a boundary between it and the rest of the Site also created. The 1960s OS map also shows a pond to the east of the cricket ground. Little changes within the Study Area until the 1980s when a housing estate is constructed immediately to the south of the Site.

Post-1990 APs show the cricket ground has been removed, along with the boundary, returning the Site to one field.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Due to the proximity of the Site to known heritage assets there is an uncertain possibility of disturbing remains from the prehistoric period which could be of up to regional significance. Although there are no known Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. There is a medium possibility of disturbing medieval and/or post-medieval remains relating to farming activities which are considered to be of between medium-local to negligible significance.

Survival

The survival of heritage assets is considered to be good across the Site as it has remained largely undisturbed save for the work associated with the construction of the cricket ground. This is unlikely to have caused any disturbance to sub-surface remains, however, with the type of building erected for the pavilion unknown the level of disturbance within its footprint cannot presently be determined. Disturbance is likely to have been caused during the construction of the pond within the Site where survival is considered to be poor.





There is one designated heritage asset within the Study Area, a Grade II Listed granary and stable building. The Scheduled cross in the courtyard of St Leonard's Church and the Grade II* Listed church building are located within 500m of the Site to the northeast.

There are two undesignated heritage assets recorded within the Site the first of which is the findsport an early prehistoric fingernail scraper. The second is the Thrybergh Deer Park which was established between 1259-1260, extended between 1670-80 and likely redeveloped in the 19th century.

Three undesignated heritage assets are recorded within the Study Area. A Bronze Age scraper was found approximately 290m west of the Site. The suggested route of a Roman period road running from Brough (Derby) past the Roman fort at Templeborough and on towards Doncaster is located approximately 55m to the east of the Site. A celtic-style head carved on a rectangular gritstone block and probably of Romano-British date was found approximately 150m west of the Site.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records post-medieval ridge and furrow within the Site and the Study Area, with a medieval/post-medieval fishpond recorded within the Study Area approximately 180m north-northeast of the Site. A 20th-century air raid shelter is also recorded within the Study Area located approximately 110m south of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1967-2005 with a fragmentary historic character of Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Private Parkland 1800-1966 and Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Deer Park 1259-1799. The Site is assigned to the Private Parkland character zone.

Comparison of Historic OS maps indicates that by the 1st Edition 1854 map the Site was mostly occupied by the Thrybergh Deer Park with the most southerly section contained within one field. The map makes reference to an ice house located in the northwestern corner of the Site. By the 1900 OS map little has changed within the Site however a railway line is shown to be under construction immediately bounding the western and southern edges of the Site. By the 1920s OS map reference to the ice house has disappeared whilst the 1930s map shows a sewage pumping station built immediately to the north of the Site. By the 1960s OS map the two sections of the Site have been amalgamated with the Deer Park no longer referenced. The 1950s-60s OS maps indicates the Site has been subject to a large area of opencast mining with later maps suggesting the whole Site has been used for mining.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be contained within one field of arable land.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Given the evidence for opencast workings within the Site any potential heritage assets are very likely to have been destroyed.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets at the Site is considered to be poor due to disturbance from late 20th century opencast mining operations.





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets within the Site or Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records the extent of the area used by the former Dinnington Main Colliery within the northwestern corner of the Site. Post-medieval ridge and furrow is recorded within the Study Area located approximately 230m northnortheast of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Commercial: Shopping Centre 2002-2006 with an invisible historic character of Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Allotments 1910-2001, Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1909 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Planned Industrial Settlements character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was split between four fields with a track running through to the south by the 1st Edition OS map (1854). Little changes within the Site until the 1930s when the Site is referred to as being "Allotment Gardens" for the newly constructed housing along the northern and eastern edges of the Site with some of the field boundaries having been removed. The 1972 OS map appears to show several small buildings erected within the northwest corner of the Site, likely sheds for the allotments with only one field boundary remaining. Later mapping suggests a small section of the north-western corner of the Site falls into the Dinnington Main Colliery.

The modern OS map indicates the allotments have been cleared and all internal boundaries removed, save for a small square area against the northern site boundary. A possible garage structure is located in the south east corner of the site and a new road runs along the western site boundary.

The post-1990s APs suggest the Site comprises rough scrub with a square tarmacked area at the northern end.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. From the HEC and historic OS maps evidence of medieval/post-medieval agricultural activity can be expected but would be of negligible significance. The small northwestern corner of the Site that appears to have been included within "Dinnington Main Colliery" can expected to have been disturbed and have little or no archaeological potential.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good in areas not within the colliery site.





There are three statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area consisting of two Grade II Listed houses, Limelands and 4, Laughton Road, and one Grade II Listed farmhouse and attached farmbuildings. The Grade II* Listed Dinnington Hall is located within the broader landscape, 500m, approximately 360m south of the Site.

The SMR records three undesignated heritage assets. All are located approximately 180m south east of the site and comprise the site of a relocated medieval cross, a 19th-century church built possibly on the site of an earlier church, and a late 17th-century house

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records two areas of post-medieval ridge and furrow approximately 120m south of the Site which are part of a larger complex of ridge and furrow extending beyond the Study Area. Also recorded within the Study Area are a post-medieval ditch and rectangular enclosure approximately 160m south of the Site and the extent of the Dinnington Main Colliery 5m west of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Unenclosed Land: Regenerated Scrubland 1991-2005 with a partial historic character of Extractive: Deep Shaft Coal Mine 1905-1990, Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1904 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Post Industrial character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was split between three fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) with two field boundaries running in a broadly southeast northwest alignment. By the 1900 OS map the most northerly of these boundaries has been removed leaving the Site to occupy two fields. The 1930s OS map indicates that "Allotment Gardens" have been created across the Site in order to serve the increase in housing within the immediate area. Little changes is visibile on the Site until the early 1980s when the allotments appear to have been removed along with the remaining field boundary and the Site is noted as being part of the "Disused Workings" for the adjacent colliery.

Modern OS Maps indicate further residential development has occurred around the Site with the additional introduction of several new roads to the north.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be under scrubland and trees.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area although the Grade II* Listed Rainborough Lodges and Gates are located approximately 340m southwest of the Site. 





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets recorded with the Site or the Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records one feature within the Study Area relating to the site of the former Maltby Colliery.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Woodland: Ancient Woodland 1066-2005 and Residential: Planned Estate (Social Housing) 1966-2005 with an invisible historic character of Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1965 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. From the 1965 OS map onwards the buildings within the northwest corner appear to be gradually removed until only one is shown to remain by the 1976 OS map, otherwise the Site undergoes little change.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be currently under grass with a noticeable change in vegetation over the area formerly occupied by the buildings. A large new housing estate has been constructed across Westfield Road to the northwest.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. There is a medium possibility of disturbing evidence for medieval and post-medieval agriculture, given the proximity of recorded ridge and furrow earthworks; such evidence would be considered of medium-local to negligible significance. There is a high possibility of disturbing 19th century or earlier building remains which are considered to be of medium-local significance as they may represent early industrial examples of domestic structures associated with the coal mining industry within the area. Additionally, there is a possibility of encountering evidence for early industrial mining which, depending on their date, could be up to high-local significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets associated with the 19th century or earlier buildings is considered to be good on this Site due to a lack of modern disturbance. The likely survival of earlier heritage assets is considered to be poor for areas disturbed by the buildings but good for the rest of the Site.

Note

The evidence for 19th century workers housing associated with the coal mining industry, especially outside of major population centres, would usually require "Potential" archaeological objection. However, as they only occupy a small area of the Site, archaeological objections are recorded as "Uncertain".



There is one statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site a Grade II Listed farmhouse and cottage which evolved to its current form by 1840 but is thought to be medieval in origin, originally timber framed but encased in stone probably before 1700. There are three statutorily designated heritage assets, all Grade II Listed Buildings, within the Study Area which comprise a 17th century barn immediately adjacent to the northwest corner of the Site, an 18th century church approximately 100m northwest of the Site and an 18th century farm complex approximately 230m west of the Site.

The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Study Area consisting of the site of Old Hall Farm, a timber-framed house demolished c.1980 located approximately 180m northwest of the Site.

The Site was not included in the Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being Commercial: Commercial Core-Suburban 1900-2003 with a partial historic character of Residential: Vernacular Cottages 1066 - 1899. The Site is assigned to the Nucleated Rural Settlements character zone. The place description from the HEC notes that many of the medieval plot boundaries within this character area built along Melton High Street are still preserved with the long perpendicular plots still somewhat discernable.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was occupied by housing prior to the First Edition OS map (1854). The configuration of buildings visible on the First Edition OS map appears to remain broadly the same despite the construction of houses immediately east of the Site visible on the 1976 OS map.

The Modern OS maps indicate three buildings occupying the Site, while the others in the middle have been demolished

Post-1990 APs show the Site to have one standing building remaining, the Grade II Listed farmhouse with a ruinous building visible in the southwest corner with other potential ruins on the eastern edge of the Site. The rest of the Site is primarily under grass and trees.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

The presence of standing remains of the Grade II Listed farmhouse and the ruins of other buildings, coupled with the remnants of the medieval burgage plots discerned by the HEC means there is a high likelihood of disturbing remains from the medieval period and beyond. These are likely to include archaeological remains associated with prolonged occupation from the medieval period, in addition to the buildings themselves. Any remains uncovered are considered to be of up to high-local significance.

Survival

The survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of modern disturbance coupled with the extant buildings within the

There are four statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area, the closest of which is a Grade II Listed farmhouse and cottage approximately 40m north of the Site which evolved to its current form by 1840 but is thought to be medieval in origin, originally timber framed but encased in stone probably before 1700. The three remaining designated assets, all Grade II Listed Buildings, comprise a 17th century barn approximately 50m northwest the Site, an 18th century church approximately 130m northwest of the Site and an 18th century farm complex approximately 250m west of the Site.

The Site was not included in the Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site to be Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1855-2003 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Piecemeal Enclosure 1066-1854. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone. The place description from the HEC notes that some of the plots within this character area are long, thin and perpendicular to Melton High Street suggesting their origin as crofting plots.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within one field on the First Edition OS map (1854) and had a small sub-division within the northwest corner of the Site. This small sub-division is shown to be again sub-divided into two smaller fields by the 1890s OS map which remains until the 1930s OS map. Otherwise, the Site changes very little.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be primarily under grass and scrub with the enclosure tarmacked and with a building having been constructed on it.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the proiximity of the Site to known heritage assets and notations within the HEC suggesting the medieval origins of the plots perpendicular to the High Street there is a high likelihood of encountering remains from this period through to the 19th century. The significance of any remains encountered is recorded as unknown.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of disturbance except for the area presently under tarmac where survival is considered to be moderate to poor especially within the footprint of the building within its southwest corner.



There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Site consisting of an Iron Age/Romano-British trackway, enclosures and field boundaries identified as cropmarks from aerial photographs.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, which only covers the easten edge of the Site, records earthworks relating to the boundary of a 20th century colliery approximately 135m north of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1946-2003 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1814-1945 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1813. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was spilt between four regularly sized fields with straight north-south boundaries on the First Edition OS map (1854). The Dearne and Dove Canal lay immediately adjacent to the Site along its northern edge. By the 1890s OS map one of the boundaries has been removed leaving three fields, the most westerly of which is noted to be "Allotment Gardens by the 1930s OS map. Little changes on the Site throughout the rest of the 20th century with only the most easterly boundary within the Site removed.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to only have one boundary remaining towards the eastern edge of the Site and is currently being used for farming.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Due to the presence of Iron Age/Romano-British features identified from aerial photographs within the Site there is a high likelihood of encountering settlement remains from this period which are considered to be of regional significance. Due to the presence of an extant field boundary pre-dating the drafting of the First Edition OS map and the conclusions of the HEC there is a high-likelihood of encountering remains relating to post-medieval farming practices. 



There are no statutorily designated heritage assets or undesignated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records one feature within the Study Area, an Iron Age/Romano-British rectilinear enclosure visible as cropmarks located approximately 210m south of the Site. Within the broader landscape, 500m, are various examples of medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1950-2003 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1949 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Strip Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicate the Site has remained essentially unchanged since the First Edition OS map (1854), contained within one field. To the north of the Site the First Edition OS map shows a large section of land given over to sandstone quarrying which continues into the 1960s. On the 1966 OS map the area around the Site begins to be built upon which continues throughout the 1970s, 80s and 90s.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to still be contained within one field, currently used as arable land.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. There is an increased likelihood of encountering Iron Age/Romano-British remains within the Site due to its proximity to features of this date identified nearby by aerial photographs. Any remains encountered from this period would be of at least regional significance. The presence of earthworks relating to post-medieval ridge and furrow within the broader landscape makes the likelihood of encountering features relating to medeival/post-medeival agriculture greater, although the possibility of encountering such remains still recorded as uncertain with their significance recorded as medium-local to negligible.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of disturbance, there is no evidence to suggest the quarrying activities extended into the Site.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area. The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Site comprising of the site of a Cold War Royal Observer Corps Monitoring Post demolished in 1993.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records the aforementioned monitoring post within the Site. The project also records an Iron Age/Romano-British field boundary and rectilinear enclosure within the Study Area approximately 200m south-west of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Residential: Private Housing Estate 1923-2003 with a significant historic character of Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1922 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Early to Mid 20th Century Private Suburbs character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was spread across four long strip fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) and contained a sandstone quarry. By the 1900s OS map the quarry has expanded to cover most of the Site, save for the middle strip field, although most of the field boundaries appear to remain intact. By the 1958 OS map reference to the guarry has disappeared, although the scars are still visible.

Post-1990 APs shows the Site to be under grass with its field boundaries still intact.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

There is a high likelihood of disturbing remains relating to post-medieval strip fields which likely includes the field boundaries, considered to be of low-local to negligible significance. There is a possibility of encountering remains of the 20th century military building which remained until 1991, the significance of which is currently recorded as unknown.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be variable. While it appears that the field boundaries within the Site have remained intact, much of the Site has seen significance disturbance from 19th and 20th century quarrying activities across the majority of the Site aside from the middle strip field which seems to have remained relatively undisturbed. As such, survival of pre-19th century heritage assets is considered to be good in the middle strip field but poor elsewhere. It is unclear as to the survival of the Royal Observer Corps Monitoring Post as it was apparently destroyed in 1993, however, the nature of the feature leaves the possibility that some, or all, of the subterranean section of the post may survive.



There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area. The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Study Area comprising a group of four pottery wasters found in a land drain approximately 110m north-north-west of the Site.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records one feature within the Study Area comprising earthworks related to post-medieval ridge and furrow approximately 190m north-west of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Unenclosed Land: Regenerated Scrubland 1983-2006 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1779-1982 and Unenclosed land: Commons and greens 1066-1775; and Residential: Planned Estate (Social Housing) 1986-2005 with an invisible historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1796-1985 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1795. The Site is split between the Post Industrial and Municipal Suburbs character zones.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site largely contained one field at the southern end, bounded to the north by a track way on the First Edition OS map (1854). North of the trackway, the Site covers the southern end of four strip fields. Later maps show the trackway running adjacent to a water course. One of the strip field boundaries has been removed by the 1890s map. By the 1930s OS map a water works and housing estate have been built along the western edge of the Site with further development occurring to the north by the 1976 OS map. During this development the rest of the field boundaries in the northern section of the Site are removed.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be scrubland with the track still in use.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. There is a possibility of disturbing remains relating to post-medieval farming practices which are considered to be of low-local to negligible significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance.





There are five statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area comprising five Grade II Listed buildings, four of which are associated with "Kiveton Hall" built in the early 19th century on the site of an earlier hall, approximately 140m north of the Site. Kiveton Hall and its associated park likely had their origins in the medieval period. The SMR records two undesignated heritage assets within the Study Area consisting of the documented site of a medieval Chantry Chapel, approximately 240m south-west of the Site, and a stone mould find, approximately 125m north of the Site.

The Site was not included in the Magensian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the site.

The HEC records the site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1999-2005 with fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1821-1998, Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Private Parkland 1700-1811 and Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Possible Deer Park 1066-1699. The Site is assigned to the Private Parkland character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site to be within parkland with a driveway to "Kiveton Farm" crossing the north-west corner of the Site on the First Edition OS map (1854). The Site remains within parkland until the 1970s, after which the land to the south-west is developed as a housing estate.

Post-1990 APs show the Site as an open field used for arable cultivation with the driveway removed.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the site, such remains are difficult to predict, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to information gathered for the HEC there is a possibility of disturbing remains relating to a medieval/post-medieval deer park which would be of up to high-local significance.

Survival

The survival of heritage assets is considered to be moderate to good as the Site has formerly been parkland. More recently, the Site has been subject to ploughing for arable cultivation destroying any above ground remains associated with the earlier park.





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area.

The Site was not included in the Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as split between Enclosed Land: Crofts 1540-2003 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539 and Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1967-2005 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land Strip Fields 1540-1966 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Agglomerated Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site to be contained within eight fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) with all but one of the field boundaries aligned northwest-southeast with a house abutting the Site to the north. By the 1890s OS map the single northeast-southwest boundary has been removed. The 1900 OS map indicates the presence of a "Shaft" approximately 100m, to the east of the Site and by the 1920s OS map the "Smithy Wood Colliery" is referenced with features related to the colliery reaching the edge of the Site by the 1930s OS map. During this period several large buildings are also constructed to the northeast of the Site for the colliery in addition to a "pumping station" and "baths". The Site remains relatively unchanged until the 1985 OS map when a field boundary on the western edge is shown to have been removed.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be currently under grass with all of the field boundaries remaining intact.





There is one statutorily designated heritage asset within the Site comprising the Grade II Listed "Cutlers Arms", an early 20th century public house. There are a further twelve designated heritage assets within the Study Area. The Grade I Listed "Church of All Saints", located approximately 200m north-north-east of the Site, traces its origins to the 14th century. The Grade II* Listed "25 and 27 High Street", located approximately 145m north-east of the Site, is part of a former inn with a timber-frame core built in two phases: late 15th and late 16th/early 17th centuries. Ten Grade II Listed Buildings are also recorded within the Study Area comprising houses, industrial buildings and a lamppost. Within the broader landscape, 500m, of the Site lie the Scheduled Monument and Grade I Listed "Rotherham Bridge" constructed in the 15th century and the Grade I Listed "Chapel of our Lady" an 11th century bridge chapel.

The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Site relating to the former Bath Foundry established prior to 1849 which manufactured cast iron stove grates and cooking ranges. There are a further 20 undesignated heritage assets recorded within the Study Area including the suggested route of the Brough to Doncaster Roman Road which passed the fort at Templeborough. Evidence for the medieval occupation of Rotherham was uncovered during excavations on High Street and Vicarage Lane, approximately 180m north-east of the Site, where 13th and 14th century occupation layers were uncovered alongside an oven feature dated to the 14th or 15th century. Many of the records represent the town's industrial heritage from the late 18th century onwards including a brass foundry approximately 20m south of the Site and the site of the Guest and Chimes Foundry to the west of the Site across the River Don where eight instances of archaeological work have been carried out ranging from buildings appraisals to evaluations.

The Site was not included in the Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Communications: Car Park 1970-2003 with a fragmentary historic character of Industrial: Metal Trades (Light) 1883-1969 and Residential: Burgage Plots 1066-1882; and Commercial: Distribution Centre 1956-2003 with a fragmentary historic character of Communications: Train Station 1838-1955 and Residential: Burgage Plots 1066-1837. The Site is assigned to the Complex Historic Town Cores character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was densley occupied by buildings, including the early foundry, on the First Edition OS (1854). Within the northern section of the Site was "Rotherham Station" with the rest of the Site covered mainly with housing fronting onto Westhgate with garden plots to the rear, some of which appears to have retained their medieval burgage plot boundaries. Also noted on the early map is the location of public baths close to the original "Bath Foundry" buildings. By the 1900 OS map, the majority of the houses have been replaced by large buildings associated with the foundry with the railway station having seemingly expanded slightly to the south. Some houses may remain within the southeast corner of the Site. By the 1930s map, the railway station has been renamed "Westgate Station". Some of the main foundry buildings within the Site appear to have been altered or removed with one large building prominent in the middle. By the 1956 map, the railway station appears to have fallen out of use with a new building constructed within this section by the 1980 OS map. By the 1985 OS map the large main foundry building appears to have been removed with some of the smaller buildings within the Site still standing.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to have the large building within the northern section, a group of buildings along the eastern edge, a large building towards the south-eastern corner and a small building within the south-east corner still standing. The rest of the Site has been tarmacked to create a car park.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

There is a high possibility of disturbing the remains of the 19th century Bath Foundry and Westgate Station which are considered to be of medium-local significance. There is also a high possibility of encountering the remains of 19th century and later domestic dwellings, courtyards and workers housing which is considered to be up to medium-local significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on the Site is considered to be variable. The Site contains an extant heritage asset in the form of the Grade II Listed "Cutlers Arms". In areas which have had modern buildings erected survival of heritage assets is considered to be poor with those areas under tarmac considered have moderate to poor survival. The survival of heritage assets before the expansion of the Bath Foundry in the middle of the 19th century, including the medieval burgage plots visible on the First Edition OS map is poor.

Note

Despite the presence of the statutorily designated building within Site, which would usually require "Major" archaeological objections, the level of preservation across the Site is judged to be mostly poor due to modern development. Thus, archaeological objections are recorded as "Potential" in this instance.





There is one statutorily designated heritage asset within the Study Area, a Grade II Listed early-mid 18th century "Dovecote" located approximately 30m north of the Site. There are no undesignated heritage assets recorded within the Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records two groups of earthworks and cropmarks within the Site relating to medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1974-2005 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Piecemeal Enclosure 1066-1973; Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1974-2005 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-1973 and Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 1066-1767; and Communications: Motorway and Trunk Road Junctions 1967-2003 with an invisible historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-1966 and Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 1066-1767. The Site is split between the Agglomerated Enclosure, Surveyed Enclosure and Post Industrial character zones.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site to contain fourteen fields and two roads on the First Edition OS map (1854). By the 1890s OS map the most southerly field boundary has been removed and a road towards "Vessey Close Farm" to the north has also disappeared. Little changes on the Site until the 1930s map when a further field boundary within the middle of the Site is removed. By the mid-1970s OS maps a motorway has been constructed along the western edge of the Site.

Post-1990s APs show the Site to have changed little since the 1970s and is currently being used for farming.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains from these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the presence of medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow identified by aerial photographs within the Site, there is a high likelihood of disturbing these remains which are considered to be of medium-local significance. Other other post-medieval agricultural features, boundary ditches etc., are considered to be of negligible significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance.



There is one statutorily designated heritage asset within the Study Area, the early 19th century Grade II Listed "Conduit House Farmhouse". There are no undesignated heritage assets recorded within the Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records earthworks and cropmarks within the Study Area relating to medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow immediately to the east of the Site with further examples approximately 100m south of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1974-2005 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-1973 and Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 1066-1767. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was split between three fields with two rows of housing, likely comprising eight dwellings, within the northern corner on the First Edition OS map (1854). By the 1890s OS, map a further field boundary has been added within the Site and a new building constructed within the south-western corner which is noted as "Woodville Cottage" by the 1930s OS map which also shows a well. On the 1902 OS map only one row of four buildings remains. By the 1956 OS map, a building has been constructed adjacent to the western edge of the Site. By the 1980s the building in the northern corner of the Site has been added to and is now noted to be a "Nursery".

Post-1990s APs indicate the further buildings have been constructed immediately south of the "Nursery" leaving only the eastern section of the Site under grass.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the proximity of the Site to earthworks and cropmarks relating to medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow there is a possibility of encountering similar remains within the Site which would be of medium-local to negligible significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets one this Site is variable. In areas where buildings have been constructed survival is likely be poor with survival good in the sections which have not been undisturbed.



There is one statutorily designated heritage asset within the Study Area, the early 19th century Grade II Listed "Conduit House Farmhouse" located approximately 160m south-east of the Site. There are no undesignated heritage assets recorded within the Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records earthworks and cropmarks within the Study Area relating to medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow approximately 95m south and 105m west of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1974-2005 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-1973 and Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 1066-1767. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was split between three fields with one boundary running in a north-west south-east alignment with a further triangular shaped boundary within the north-west corner. The 1890s OS map indicates an "Old Quarry" along the western edge of the Site references to which have disappeared by the 1930s OS map. By the 1900s OS map, the triangular boundary has been removed. The Site remains relatively unchanged for the rest of the 20th century

Post-1990 APs show the Site to still be within two fields currently used for agriculture.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the proximity of the Site to earthworks and cropmarks relating to medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow there is a possibility of encountering agricultural remains of the same date within the Site which would be of medium-local to negligible significance. There is a high likelihood of encountering remains relating to 19th century, or earlier, quarrying activities noted on historic maps. The significance of any remains uncovered would be of negligible significance

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good except for the area identified as an "Old Quarry" where survival of pre-19th century remains is judged to be poor. The survival of the remains of the 19th quarrying activities is considered to be good.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area. The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Study Area, flint waste and core possibly of Mesolithic type approximately 65m northwest of the Site.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records features within the Site comprising earthworks relating to post-medieval ridge and furrow.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1974-2005 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Piecemeal Enclosure 1540-1973 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Agglomerated Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within two fields with one field boundary running in a north-south alignment on the First Edition OS map (1854). Little changes on the Site until the 1930s OS map when the western section of the Site is noted as being used as "Allotment Gardens" presumably to serve the large, new housing estate constructed to the southwest. The Site changes little throughout the 20th century, the 1972 OS maps indicates a house. The property labelled as "Ty Newydd", is first shown on the 1972 OS map immediately to the south of the Site.

Modern OS maps indicate the Site has been further subdivided with one large boundary running in a north-south alignment and a further two boundaries within the newly created middle field. A small building has also been erected within the southeast corner of the Site.

Post-1990 APs show the western section of the Site to be under grass/scrub with the eastern section under grass. The middle field appears to be used for horse riding with its most northern section under grass. The building in the southeast corner appears to be deserted and in a ruinous state.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. 



There are four statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area and all are Grade II Listed buildings associated with "Kiveton Hall" and the former "Kiveton Park". Within the broader landscape, 500m, lies the medieval "Todwick Manor" Scheduled Monument and the Grade II* Listed medieval "Church of St Peter and St Paul".

The SMR records three undesignated heritage assets within the Study Area. The site of a post-medieval ore roasting hearth, approximately 200m north-north-east of the Site, was uncovered during an archaeological excavation which also recovered 13th and 14th century pottery. Within the same area the SMR records examples of ridge and furrow, visible on the ground and also identified during a gradiometer survey. Excavations in the area revealed three agricultural ditches containing 12th and 14th century pottery. Finally, a stone mould for a Lombardic letter "H" or "L" was found approximately 175m north-north-east of the Site.

The Site was not included in the Magensian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the site.

The HEC records the majority of the Site as being split between Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1974-2005 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1761-1973 and Unenclosed Land: Commons and greens 1066-1760; and Residential: Private Housing Estate 1987-2006 with an invisible historic character of Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1986. The Site is split between the Surveyed Enclosure and Late 20th Century Private Suburbs character zones.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within one field known as "Windmill Hill" on the First Edition OS map (1855). The field name suggests a windmill was sited here previously, but its exact location is unknown. Little changes on the Site throughout the 20th century.

Post-1990 APs shows the majority of the Site to comprise an open field used for arable cultivation. A boundary separates this from an uncultivated strip of land at the northern end of the Site which may be used for grazing. A small area of hard-standing and sheds/outbuildings are located in the north-eastern corner.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to proximity of the Site to known heritage assets, 12th to 14th century pottery finds and ridge and furrow identified through geophysical survey, there is a low possibility for the presence of remains from the medieval and post-medieval period to be encountered, which would be of up to medium-local significance.

Surviva

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance.





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets within the Study Area.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records one feature within the Site comprising of cropmarks relating to an Iron Age/Romano-British enclosure and a one feature within the Study Area, approximately 10m south of the Site, comprising earthworks relating to post-medieval ridge and furrow.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-2003 with a significant historic character of Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Strip Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site contained four fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) with three strip fields separated by boundaries running in a north-south alignment. The most easterly of these fields is divided in two by an east-west aligned boundary. By the 1890s OS map one of the north-south boundaries within the western half of the Site has been removed. The 1920s OS map indicates a series of houses have been constructed along the eastern edge of the Site. Little changes on the Site thoughout the 20th century with a house being constructed immediately south of the Site by the 1983 OS map.

The modern OS maps indicate the construction of a stable along the northern edge of the Site with a new north-south boundary added along with further sub-division of this new middle field. The new boundary may be following the line of the former field boundary removed in the 1890s, although there is a discrepancy between their alignments on the 1890s OS map and the modern map this may be an issue with the georeferencing of the former.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to mostly be used for farming with the exception of the middle field which is under grass with parts seemingly used for horse riding.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known remains from the prehistoric or Anglo-Saxon periods within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disurbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to this period is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the presence of a feature identified through aerial photography there is a high possibility of disturbing remains from the Iron Age/Romano-British period. Any remains of this period uncovered would be of regional significance. Due to the proximity of the Site to post-medieval ridge and furrow identified through aerial photography there is a high possibility of encountering remains relating to post-medieval agricultural activity within the Site. Any such remains uncovered are considered to be of negligible significance.

Survival

The survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance excepting for the area now occupied by the stable.





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets within the Study Area. Within the broader landscape, 500m, lie the Grade I Listed "Church of All Saints" and the Grade II* Listed "Aughton Court.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records a cropmark relating to a medieval/post-medieval bank approximately 130m north-north-east of the Site and a complex of cropmarks and earthworks relating to post-medieval ridge and furrow, including examples of narrow ridge and furrow, approximately 100m northwest and 180m north-east of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Unenclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-2003 with an invisible historic character of Unenclosed Land: Commons and greens 1066-1767. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site contained three fields separated by two boundaries running in a rough north-east-south-west alignment on the First Edition OS map (1854). The Site remains relatively unchanged until the late 1960s when a sewage works is constructed within the middle field, after which little changes on the Site. By the 1980s a large housing estate and school have been constructed to the west and north-west of the Site and a by-pass constructed along the southeastern edge by the 1990s.

Post-1990 APs show the sewage works to have been removed and the Site to be under grass/scrub.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. 

There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Site consisting of an Iron Age/Romano-British trackway, enclosures and field boundaries identified from cropmarks on aerial photographs. The identified cropmark features, however, lie in the fields to the west and south-west of the Site.



There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area; however the Scheduled Monument "Roman Ridge" is located within the Site's broader landscape, 500m. The SMR records one feature within the Site, a large Iron Age/Romano-British enclosure identified from aerial photographs. Various sherds of Roman pottery and undated flint fragments were found within the plough soil approximately 50m east of the Site. The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Enclosed Land: Agglomerated fields 1931-2003 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Piecemeal Enclosure 1841-1930, Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Sports Ground 1758-1840 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1757; and Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1750-2003 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1749. The Site is split between the Surveyed Enclosure and Split Enclosure character zones.





The Site remains relatively unchanged throughout the 20th century aside from a building constructed within the south-west corner of the Site in the late 1960s/early 1970s.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to have changed little with most of the fields used for farming excepting for the area occupied by the former coal pit which is contained within a wooded area with the building extant in the south-west corner.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the presence of ridge and furrow within the Site there is a high possibility of disturbing remains relating to medieval/post-medieval farming practices. Any remains encountered could be of up to high-local significance. Due to the presence of a coal mining features identified on historic maps there is a high possibility of encountering these remains which could date to mid-19th century or possibly early. The remains could be up to be up to high-local significance.

Survival

The likely Survival of heritage assets within the Site is good due to a lack of previous disturbance except for the northeast corner of the Site. Within this section the survival of pre-19th century heritage assets is considered to be poor due to disturbance from the coal mining activity within this section. The survival of remains from the 19th century coal mining is considered to be good due to a lack of modern disturbance. Likely survival of heritage assets within the footprint of the building within the south west corner of the site is considered to be poor.

There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. The SMR records one feature within the Site's broader landscape, 500m, comprising well preserved, north-south aligned, ridge and furrow noted during a watching brief for a pipeline in the area. When excavated, it was clear the furrows stopped short of the field boundary to the south of the field suggesting this boundary either pre-dates the ridge and furrow or follows a headland marking a change of orientation of the furrows. The initial field survey for the pipeline also noted some eastwest aligned components to the pattern of earthworks, possibly as a result of later disturbance from mining activities.

The Site was not included in the Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project, so no information is available on the extent of any cropmark features in or adjoining the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure 1820-2004 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1819. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site is split between eight fields on the First Edition OS map (1855). By the 1890s OS map a residential dwelling, "Westfield House", has been built within the south-west corner of the Site as well as several buildings which make up the "Melton Field Fire Clay Works" in the north-east corner. By the 1930s the clay works buildings have been removed with its area of excavation still remaining within the north-east corner of the Site. By the mid-1960s the Site is split over six fields with several boundaries having been removed. By the late 1960s/early 1970s a new building has been constructed within the north-east corner of the Site.

Post-1990s APs show the Site to primarily be under grass with many of the fields used for horse riding activities. There have been several additional buildings constructed within the north-east corner of the Site.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the presence of ridge and furrow earthworks within the broader landscape there is a possibility of disturbing remains relating to medieval/post-medieval farming practices. Any remains encountered would be up to high-local significance. Due to the presence of a 19th century fire clay works, identified from historic mapping, there is a high possibility of encountering these remains which could be of medium-local significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is variable. In areas with no previous disturbance survival is considered to be good. In the section of the Site occupied by "Westfield House" survival of heritage assets is considered to be poor. In the north-east section of the Site the survival of pre-19th century remains is poor due to disturbance from the clay works. The survival of the clay works is considered to be moderate depending on the type of building and construction methods used for the building now occupying this section.





There are four statutorily designated heritage assets within the Study Area comprising three Grade II Listed farmhouses "Conduit House", 80m west of the Site; "Hardwick Grange", 50m west of the Site, and "Hardwick Hall", 120m north of the Site and a Grade II Listed milepost approximately 150m east of the Site. A series of archaeological investigations along the new route of the A57, including geophysics and trial trenches, within the Site failed to identify any significant archaeological features.

The SMR records a medieval timber framed cottage, only a small section of which is now visible, opposite "Hardwick Grange Farmhouse" approximately 170m north of the Site. Located approximately 70m west of the Site is a medieval timber framed barn characterised by three posts remaining within its stone walls. Close to this, 95m north of the Site, is a slabbed medieval trackway known as "Monk's Path" reputed to run from Thorpe Salvin to Roche Abbey.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records a number of areas of medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow in the Study Area identified through cropmarks and earthworks from aerial photographs.

The HEC records the present character of the Site being predominantly Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1974-2005 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Piecemeal Enclosure 1066-1973. A small section of the Site is recorded as being Residential: Farm Complex 1066-2005. The Site is split between the Agglomerated Enclosure, Surveyed Enclosure and Nucleated Rural Settlements character zones.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was spread across seventeen fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) with three old quarries noted within the Site. By the 1890s OS map several field boundaries have been removed leaving only fourteen fields within the Site. By the 1900s map further boundaries have been removed to leave twelve fields with the quarry noted along the eastern edge of the Site having been reopened or excavations have begun in a similar location. By the 1967 OS map a further boundary has been removed leaving ten fields within the Site, with nine fields remaining by the early 1980s. By the 1990s the Site is contained within seven fields.

Post-1990 APs indicate the Site remains in the same configuration as during the 1990s and is used for farming.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to this period is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the proximity of the Site to known medieval heritage assets and medieval features identified through aerial photographs there is a possibility of disturbing remains from this period. The significance of such remains is unknown. Due to the proximity of the Site to post-medieval ridge and furrow identified from aerial photographs and the presence of extant field boundaries pre-1854 there is a high possibility of disturbing remains from this period. Any post-medieval period remains uncovered would be of medium-local to negligible significance. There is a high possibility of disturbing remains relating to 19th century quarrying activities considered to be of negligible significance.

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance. The survival of pre-19th century remains within the areas identified as quarries is considered to be poor, however, the survival of the quarrying remains is considered to be good.





The Site is split between the Agglomerated Enclosure, Surveyed Enclosure and Post Industrial character zones.





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. Within the broader landscape, 500m, lie the medieval Grade I Listed "Church of All Saints" and the 18th century "Aughton Court".

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records twelve areas of medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow, identified by earthworks and cropmarks, within the Site and various further examples to the south and west of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1945-2003 with a fragmentary historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-1944 and Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 1066-1767; Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1944 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539; and Residential: Villas/Detached Housing 1948-2003 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1947 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is split between the Surveyed Enclosure, Agglomerated Enclosure and Early to Mid-20th Century Private Suburbs.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was covered with individual fields of various shapes and sizes on the First Edition OS map (1854). By the 1890s OS map several of the field boundaries have been removed within the Site. The Site changes little until the early 1940s when further field boundaries are removed. Field amalgamation continues throughout the 20th century with the only visible major change the construction of the motorway in the late 1960s along the eastern edge of the Site.

Post-1990 APs indicate the Site has undergone further boundary removal and field amalgamation and is primarily used for farming with a small section along the southern edge of the Site which appears to be used for horse riding.

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. Due to the presence of medieval/post-medieval ridge and furrow, identified from aerial photographs, there is a possibility of disturbing these remains which are considered to be of medium-local to negligible significance.

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance.

The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site contained three on the First Edition OS map (1854). By the 1890s OS map, the eastern and northern boundaries have been removed. The Site changes little up to the 1980s.

Post-1990 APs indicate the Site has undergone further boundary removal and is in arable cultivation.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The HEC records the Site to have formerly comprised the eastern end of Aston deer park, first recorded in documentary sources in 1256. The eastern boundary the park is still apparent on the First Edition OS map, although they have been removed by the 1890s. There is a possibility of disturbing remains of medieval and post-medieval date associated with the deer park which would be high-local to regional significance. There is a possibility for disturbing post-medieval agricultural remains which are considered to be low-local to negligible significance.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. Within the broader landscape, 500m, lies a section of the Scheduled "Roman Ridge" approximately 415m south-east of the Site. The SMR records one feature within the Site, an Iron Age/Romano-British trackway, enclosures and field boundaries identified through cropmarks from aerial photographs. Cropmarks of a large Iron Age/ Romano-British single ditched enclosure have also been identified approximately 210m south of the Site. The broader landscape, 500m, contains several further examples of Iron Age/Romano-British activity including earthworks and Roman pottery.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records an Iron Age/Romano-British ditch and rectilinear enclosure, approximately 250m south of the Site, and a 20th century colliery, approximately 120m north of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1946-2003 with a partial historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1814-1945 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1813. The Site is assigned to the Surveyed Enclosure character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site is split between fourteen very regularly shaped fields on the First Edition OS map (1854), with the 'Dearne and Dove Canal' forming the northern boundary of the Site. By the 1890s OS map several boundaries to the north have been removed. Little changes on the Site until the 1930s OS map when the field within the north-west corner of the Site has been noted as "Alloment Gardens". By the late 1970s/early 1980s further field boundaries are removed, a process which continues into the 1990s.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be mostly within the same configuration as outlined above with the exception of the "Allotment Gardens" which have disappeared along with their field boundary. An electricity sub-station appears to have been constructed at the eastern end of the Site.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Due to the presence of Iron Age/Romano-British features identified from aerial photographs within the Site there is a high possibility of disturbing these remains which would be of regional significance.



By the 1920s OS map a building has been constructed just outside the Site to the north-west. By the 1930s OS map houses have been built around the Site to the north-east, east and south-east. The 1956 OS map indicates a building has been constructed along the western edge of the Site which is noted as a "Nursery" by the late 1950s. By the late 1980s/early 1990s housing has been constructed to the south and south-west of the Site.

Post-1990s APs show the Site to be completely covered by nursery buildings.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within two fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) with a boundary running close to the western edge of the Site in a broadly north-south alignement. It is possible that the northwestern corner of the Site clips a standing building associated with "Greenside", however, due to the inherent error in georeferenced historic maps this cannot be definitively confirmed. 



Within the Study Area, approximately 185m north-northwest of the Site, lies the medieval, Scheduled "Cross in the churchyard of St Leonard's Church" with the 11th and 12th century Grade II* Listed "St Leonard's Church" lying approximately 190m north of the Site. Also within the Study Area is a Grade II Listed cross southeast of St Leonard's approximately 180m north-northwest of the Site. Within the broader landscape, 500m, is a further Scheduled Monument a "Cross located on the former village green".

The SMR records one undesignated heritage asset within the Site, a section of "Thrybergh Deer Park", predominantly lying to the west of the Site, which traces its origins to the 13th century. Within the Study Area, running along the eastern edge of the Site, is the presumed route of Roman Road from Brough to Doncaster via the fort at Templeborough. The SMR records the location of a Bronze Age scraper approximately 165m southeast of the Site. The Site of Thrybergh Hall, probably built in the late 14th century, lies approximately 160m north of the Site with a complex of late 18th/early 19th century agricultural buildings located in the same area. An archaeological evaluation carried out within the grounds of the Rectory at St Leonard's uncovered a substantial wall but no evidence of the medieval origins of the church were found.

The Magnsesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records earthworks relating to post-medieval ridge and furrow within the Site on the edge of the former deer park. Earthworks relating to a medieval fishpond are recorded within the Study Area, approximately 60m north of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being split between Residential: Villas/Detached Housing 1938-2003 with a partial historic character of Residential: Farm Complex 1750-1937 and Residential: Vernacular Cottages 1066-1749; and Unenclosed Land: Regenerated Scrubland 1986-2004 with a significant historic character of Ornamental, Parkland and Recreational: Deer Park 1259-1985. The Site is split between the Nucleated Rural Settlements and Private Parkland character zones.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was occupied in the northeast corner by the previously mention Grade II Cartshed and a small building on the northeastern edge on the First Edition OS map (1854) with a track running through the middle towards a well on the southern edge. A small section of the Site is within the Thrybergh Deer Park. By the 1890s OS map a boundary separating the Cartshed from the rest of the Site has been created. The 1900s OS map indicates the construction of buildings within the section of the Site within the Deer Park. By the 1920s OS map a further building has been constructed to the west of the Cartshed with another building visible on the western edge of the Site behind the 1900s buildings. The 1930s OS map shows a new building to have been constructed along the southern edge of the Site with the building in the northeast corner to have been expanded or replaced with a larger building and a further boundary added south of the Cartshed. The 1935 OS map also indicates there may be an area of disturbance within the southern section of the Site. By the 1956 OS map the buildings within the deer park have been removed and by the late 1950s a "Garage" has been constructed within the southern section of the Site.

Modern OS maps indicate a further building has been constructed along the western edge of the Site behind the "Garage".

Post-1990 APs show the areas of the Site to be occupied by buildings and car parking.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Due to the proximity of the Site to known heritage assets here is a high possibility of encountering Romano-British remains which are considered to be of high-local significance. Due to the presence of the Thrybergh Deer Park within the Site there is a high possibility of encountering medieval and later remains relating to the park which are of high-local significance. There is a high possibility of encountering 19th century remains associated with "Chestnut Tree Farm". Such remains are considered to be of low-local significance. There is also a high possibility of uncovering early 20th century remains relating to buildings constructed within the deer park which are considered to be of low-local significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is variable. There has been significant modern disturbance across part of the Site with the construction of buildings where survival is considered to be poor whereas survival within the area currently under tarmac is considered to be moderate. The likely survival of remains within the Deer Park is considered to be good, with the exception of the footprint of the former 1900s buildings.

Note

The presence of the statutorily designated building within Site would usually require "Major" archaeological objections. However, the nature of archaeological remains within the rest of the Site, in conjunction with the likely remains associated with the building being of low-local significance, lead to the recording of archaeological objections as "Potential" in this instance.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site or the Study Area. The SMR records a Bronze Age barbed and tanged arrowhead uncovered approximately 205m northwest of the Site. An archaeological evaluation carried out within the Study Area, approximately 250m southwest of the Site recovered medieval pottery, mixed with later post-medieval pottery, from topsoil and subsoil contexts suggesting a residual medieval presence but did not uncover any in-situ medeival layers. The medieval origins of the village of Swinton is further evidenced by the medieval town cross, former medieval St Mary Magdalen Chapel and former Swinton Old Hall all within the Sites' broader landscape, 500m. Additionally, the broader landscape contains the sites of the former New Don and Swinton Glasshouse Glass Works.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping project records two features within the Study Area a structure relating to a 20th century air raid shelter, approximately 30m northwest of the Site, and earthworks relating to post-medieval ridge and furrow approximately 230m west of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Institutional: Civic and Municipal Buildings 1986-2005 with an invisible historic character of Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1776-1985 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1775. The Site is assigned to the Late 20th Century Private Suburbs character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within a single strip field on the First Edition OS map (1854). The Site changes little until the 1930s OS map when a track is visible running through the Site with reference to "Allotment Gardens" to the north likely for the new houses constructed within the broader landscape. Little changes on the Site until the 1970 OS map when "Charnwood House" is constructed covering the majority of the Site save for the northwestern third.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be still occupied by "Charnwood House" with the northwestern third under grass.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance being recorded as unknown. The proximity of the Site to known heritage assets increases the likelihood of encountering medieval or post-medieval remains, particularly evidence of residential occupation, the significance of which is considered to be up to high-local, and farming practices considered to be of negligible significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be poor due to the disturbance caused by the construction of "Charnwood House", although within the northwestern third survival is considered to be moderate to good as it may have been affected by construction on adjoining sites.





There are no statutorily designated heritage assets within the Site and Study Area. The SMR records the locations of a Roman silver coin find within the Study Area, approximately 130m southeast of the Site.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records an area of post-medieval ridge and furrow approximately 160m southwest of the Site and a 20th century clay pit approximately 250m west-southwest of the Site.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as Residential: Planned Estate (Social Housing) 1957-2005 with an invisible historic character Enclosed Land: Strip Fields 1540-1956 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1539. The Site is assigned to the Municipal Suburbs character zone.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was contained within two fields with a boundary running in a north-northeast-south-southwest alignment on the First Edition OS map (1854). A further boundary is located in the northern section of the Site, north of which is a wooded area. The Site remains relatively unchanged until the 1920s OS map when the north-northeast-south-southwest boundary is removed after which the Site remains unchanged until the 1980s OS map when a building "Park Hill Lodge" has been constructed on the Site.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to still be occupied by "Park Hill Lodge" with the section to the rear covered in grass.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance recorded as unknown. The proximity of known heritage assets to the Site from the Romano-British period increases the likelihood of encountering similar remains which would be of up to regional significance. Due to the proximity of the Site to post-medieval ridge and furrow identified from aerial photographs there is an increased likelihood of encountering similar remains within the Site, however the possibility is recorded as uncertain. Any remains uncovered would be of negligible significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be poor within the footprint of "Park Hill Lodge" but moderate to good otherwise as the grassy area may have been affected by landscaping and other works associated with the construction of the lodge.





There are no statutorily designated or undesignated heritage assets recorded within the Site or Study Area. A series of archaeological investigations along the new route of the A57, including geophysics and trial trenches, within the Site failed to identify any significant archaeological features.

The Magnesian Limestone in South and West Yorkshire AP Mapping Project records four areas of post-medieval ridge and furrow, identified by earthworks and cropmarks, within the Site. Further examples of ridge and furrow are present within the Study Area in addition to a medieval earthwork bank, approximately 200m west of the Site, and a ditch and rectilinear enclosure of uncertain date 40m north-west and 250m north-north-west of the Site respectively.

The HEC records the present character of the Site as being Enclosed Land: Agglomerated Fields 1967-2005 with an invisible character split between Enclosed Land: Surveyed Enclosure (Parliamentary/Private) 1768-1966, Unenclosed Land: Commons and Greens 410-1767 and Enclosed Land: Prehistoric Field Systems -800-409; and Enclosed Land: Piecemeal Enclosure 1891-1966 and Enclosed Land: Open Fields 1066-1890.

Comparison of historic OS maps indicates the Site was split between 27 fields on the First Edition OS map (1854) with two tracks, one running in a north-west south-east alignment across the Site. The north-east boundary of the Site is defined by "Anston Brook" with another watercourse running through the centre of the Site, extending into a "Pumping Station" just beyond the south-east extent of the Site. By the 1890s OS map there are 24 fields with several boundaries having been removed and a new boundary in the northern section of the Site having been created. Little changes on the Site until the 1967 OS map when two field boundaries are removed forming 21 fields. By the late 1980s only seventeen fields remain within the Site and a house named "Brookfield" has been built in the northern section of the Site. By the 1990s the Site is split between twelve fields and a further building has been constructed along the western edge of the Site.

Post-1990 APs show the Site to be contained within five fields, one of which is substantially bigger than the others. The building along the western edge has expanded its boundaries and the small fields in the northern section of the Site around "Brookfield" still remain with only one boundary removed.

Known and Potential Heritage Assets

Although there are no known prehistoric, Romano-British or Anglo-Saxon remains within the Site, such remains are difficult to predict or exclude, especially in areas with no previous ground disturbance. The possibility of disturbing remains relating to these periods is uncertain with the significance recorded as unknown. Assessment carried out for the HEC indicates part of the Site may lie within an area previously covered by prehistoric fields systems, as evidenced by cropmarks features identified to the north of the Site. This possibility of disturbing these remains in the Site is at present unknown and would be at least of medium-local significance. Due to the presence of medieval and post-medieval features identified from aerial photographs and the presence of extant pre-1854 field boundaries within the Site there is a high likelihood of disturbing remains from this period. These are considered to be of medium-local to negligible significance.

Survival

The likely survival of heritage assets on this Site is considered to be good due to a lack of previous disturbance aside from the areas which have been built upon where survival is considered to be poor.







