#### Case Studies

**Diversionary Activities** - Evening diversionary activities were funded during the summer holidays on Flanderwell Park. This involved youth workers engaging with young people on the park by playing a range of fun games which children of all ages could get involved in and continue to play in their own time. The focus of the work was to encourage young people to use the park to its full potential whilst encouraging community pride. Each session started off with a fun litter pick and discussions around the impact of litter on our environment. Over 59 young people including adults/parents engaged with the detached youth workers and positive feedback was received. Similar detached youth work was then funded during October half term (Fawkes period).

Community Speed Watch - Several Community Speed Watch initiatives have been organised by Councillors with SYP in the Wickersley Ward. Councillors have invited residents and schools to take part in monitoring the speed of passing vehicles in areas where speeding concerns have been raised by the public. Brook Lane in Bramley has recently had improvements made to the layout of the road and councillors have funded a portable speed activation sign to further improve the safety of this road. A 20mph speed awareness sign was placed outside Sunnyside School on Flanderwell Lane this summer and the pupils took part in a speed watch.
