Case Studies

Alison Drive footpath Swallownest

In response to concerns raised by residents and the Police, Holderness Ward Councillors have worked in partnership with Streetpride and Housing to improve the area. The steps have been repaired, overgrown vegetation removed and funding was provided from the ward capital budget to provide fencing, an A frame and staggered frame all of which has improved community safety, reduced motorbike nuisance and reduced anti-social behaviour in the area.

Develop tenant engagement around community centres

Holderness Ward Councillors carry our regular roadshows where they talk to the community about what is important to them and residents told the Councillors that they were lonely so Neighbourhood Centres have been a focus for this year's budget.

The Councillors have provided funding which has been used to purchase material to redecorate Heighton View and Hepworth Drive Community Centres. Working in partnership with the residents who use the centres, Aston Tenants and Residents Association, 5th Age Charity, Restorative Justice, and Housing both these centres have been redecorated. Carpets have been cleaned, new curtains and new furniture has been provided.

Some residents at Windy Ridge expressed a feeling of social isolation but the neighbourhood centre was rarely used. The Councillors developed monthly social meetings which became a catalyst for further resident interest groups and the centre is now well used.

Crime prevention products

As part of their community safety initiatives the Holderness Ward Councillors have purchased security items such as window alarms, shed alarms and scooter alarms. These have been distributed based on a person's needs or vulnerability, for example if someone has reported problems to the Councillors or to the Police.

Other security items such as card defender wallets, property marking kits, purse bells and torches have been distributed at the Councillors Roadshows, or at Crime Prevention events that have been held in partnership with South Yorkshire Police where residents have been able to speak to the police about how to keep themselves and their homes safe and take away their free security items.
